

**Backgrounder**  
**58<sup>th</sup>Annual DPI/NGO Conference**  
**Our Challenge: Voices for Peace, Partnerships and Renewal**

**United Nations, New York, 7 – 9 September 2005**

The 58<sup>th</sup> Annual DPI/NGO Conference, entitled *Our Challenge: Voices for Peace, Partnerships and Renewal*, will provide the forum for a dynamic and diverse gathering of civil society representatives in the week preceding the 2005 World Summit of world leaders. More than 2,500 NGO representatives and other civil society partners are expected to come to New York on 7 – 9 September to underscore their support for the work of the Organization in its 60<sup>th</sup> year, especially its efforts to eradicate poverty, promote human rights and enhance collective human security through multilateral cooperation and deeper partnerships with civil society.

The 58<sup>th</sup> Annual DPI/NGO Conference is organized in partnership between the United Nations Department of Public Information and its associated NGOs, with the participation of the NGOs in consultative status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), many of whom are represented by the Conference of NGOs (CONGO). A range of other civil society organizations have been invited to participate in what will be the largest gathering of civil society actors immediately prior to the 2005 World Summit (14 – 16 September).

This gathering will be an interactive, activist Conference, inspired by a determination to fully implement the Millennium Declaration, including the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). It will be an opportunity for NGOs to present their expectations for the outcomes of the 2005 World Summit, which is looked to as a potentially pivotal event in the process of implementation of the MDGs and revitalization of the United Nations. It will underscore their specific commitments to the MDGs to 2015 and beyond.

The Conference draws its agenda from the Secretary-General's report *In Larger Freedom: Towards Development, Security and Human Rights for All*, which outlines the agenda for the 2005 World Summit. The agenda revolves around three inextricable goals: the promotion of peace and security, development and human rights. The agenda calls for action to strengthen the United Nations to meet these goals through renewal and reforms that are widely supported by the international community and civil society. The report cites key problems and reforms to be tackled through multilateral cooperation at the international, regional, national and local levels.

### **General Assembly Hearings and the M+5 NGO Network**

In January, NGOs represented by the NGO/DPI Executive Committee and CONGO joined forces to form the M+5 NGO Network, a broad-based working group that is monitoring civil society recommendations to the 2005 World Summit during the official United Nations meetings that are taking place during 2005. Key among these meetings are the General Assembly Informal Hearings with Civil Society that took place on 23 – 24 June. Member States consulted with civil society and private sector representatives regarding their views on the possible outcomes of the 2005 World Summit. These Hearings will serve to inform both the 2005 World Summit and the DPI/NGO Conference.

The M+5 NGO Network compiled a report on the views of civil society organizations which was presented at the General Assembly Hearings with civil society in June. This report will be considered at the 58<sup>th</sup> Annual DPI/NGO Conference. ### **Conference Plenary Sessions and NGO Interactive Workshops**

Throughout the three-day Conference, participants will have multiple opportunities for dialogue with a variety of stakeholders to voice their views, expand their networks and interact with Member States on the eve of the Summit. In addition to seven plenary sessions, there will be 30 Midday NGO Interactive Workshops featuring the participation of civil society, United Nations and government representatives. The President of the 59<sup>th</sup> Session of the General Assembly has been asked to oversee an interactive dialogue between representatives of Member States, parliamentarians and civil society participants on the final day of the Conference, 9 September.
